# A History of the Library

The introduction to the history of the library, taken from the library's website says, "The subject of creating a free library was first introduced at a meeting of the Anna Shaw club in March, 1897." Various clubs were interested in a free library and raised money to purchase land and commission a building. The library was first housed in a private residence on Depot Street. It was then moved to Main Street and West Water Street before the library was moved back to Main Street where it still stands today.

The money was donated by Mrs. William H. Pitt, which is why it says Pitt Memorial on the Friendship Free Library building!



"The corner stone was laid at three o'clock on July 8, 1912 by Dr. Fuller, then President of the Village," along with a time capsule containing yearbooks, poems, and obituaries of Mr. and Mrs. Pitt.

This plaque is in our foyer with the names of those involved in the library's creation.



Most of the names here represent members of cultural clubs that were popular at the time, as well as being responsible for helping to create public libraries countrywide.

The architect was Otis Dockstader, whose history is worth a section in a future newsletter. He was the architect for many beautiful and substantial buildings that still survive, including our library.

Personally, I find that library buildings themselves are as interesting as the books inside. And Friendship has a very interesting history!


